

THIRTY YEARS IN THE MAKING.

As many of you know, Saturday School has been helping students like Anna for decades. Thirty years ago, parents, educators and organizations around the country were concerned about the disparity in academic performance between groups of students. In Montgomery County, Maryland, local civic groups called on the community to help eliminate the "achievement gap" in education. Members of the MU NU Chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity headed the call. Led by teacher, administrator and philanthropist George B. Thomas Sr., the Saturday School has grown from 21 children and 19 volunteers in 1986 to a multi-program organization that provides tutoring and mentorship to more than 3,000 students each year.

As the primary program of the Learning Academy, Saturday School provides extra support in reading, language arts, math and test-taking skills. Most of our students are from families with low income. There is no other tutoring program in Montgomery County that provides both academic support and acceleration for free or at scale for families with low income.

A NEW GENERATION OVER-COMING OBSTACLES.
